Exhaust fan not in operation at time of unannounced arrival whereas as morning temperature was 84F. During inspection of whelping indoor temperature and humidity with exhaust fan working was 91F & 64%.

## Footnote 3

## Notes:

Whelping floors and walls to primary enclosures for mother's and pups not routinely cleaned or kept sanitary. Nearly all mother's found with matted coats and dirty fur.

#### Footnote 4

## Notes:

Outdoor dog runs and exercise areas are not kept in good repair so as to safely contain the animal(s) therein without injury (one Golden Retriever was loose at time of inspection). Grass runs and exercise areas are substantially covered with weeds and holes are not kept filled. Owners report that weeds are occasionally mowed, that fence rows were once addressed with weed eaters, and that holes are filled upon occasion (but not routinely, daily, or weekly).

Corner of SW yard enclosure damaged and bent with farm machinery.

#### Footnote 5

#### Notes:

Each outdoor canine enclosure is equipped with self feeders and kept full. Fly control (strips, bags) is not present and is in no way controlled (heavy presence of flies indoor and out, dead and not).

Whelping building as over-abundance of flies both living and deceased. Deceased at window sills, floor corners, ceiling, both in facility and primary enclosures.

Available personnel is insufficient for approximately one hundred thirty-one canines.

Indoor temperature of whelping building reaches or exceeds 90 degrees (media provided).

Numerous mothers, adolescents, pups in state of distress. Animals dirty and matted. One pregnant female excessively lethagic

All animals must be safely confined and not allowed out or to roam.

# Notes:

Whelping facilities found at time of unannounced re-inspection to be unclean and lacking routine maintenance of cleaning and disinfection to floors and walls (for all inhabitants).

By their own admission Loren, Lloyd, and Uncle David Lee have been providing all 131 animals with less than minimal supervision or care.

Worming protocols to whelping enclosures were blank or not completed.

Whelping building contains approximately sixteen mothers and pups all in a distressful, hot environment.

Vast majority of canines are dirty and matted.

By owners admission approximately twenty-five (more or less) canines have been re-homed or exchanged. There is no record of such for review.
